**DESCRIPTION:** Students will approach complex grammar structures and syntax through the linguistic analysis of texts and audio and visual materials. Students will learn about famous historical figures and contemporary cultural events that have influenced Italian history, art, politics, and society. While deepening their understanding of Italian culture, students enrich their vocabulary with each discussion topic and practice conversation.

The course's preliminary period includes a general review of grammatical rules and activities designed to help discover the city of Bologna, its history and culture, with a special focus on student life: the university and preparation for oral and written exams.

**ACTIVITIES**: The activities performed during the course include: reading/analyzing/summarizing of articles and biographies, grammar exercises, conversation, oral presentations, writing assignments. Homework, including composition writing and project preparation, is regularly assigned. All written work will be corrected and each student asked to revise it.

**INSTRUCTOR:** Clara Piovaccari teaches Italian as a foreign language at the language center of the University of Bologna, Bolzano and Ferrara. Prof. Piovaccari couples her teaching activity with the role of Chief of the Italian Language Certification panel.

(by completion of both course periods) **80%** 

Factors that determine final grade: Class participation: 20%

(To obtain a high grade in class participation, the student must:

- demonstrate interest in the content
- interact constantly with the teacher
- ask questions when material is not clear
- contribute to discussions)

Homework, compositions / summaries / analysis/summary of articles: 20%

(To obtain a high grade the student must:

- punctually turn in carefully written, wellprepared assignments
- turn in assignments having clearly paid attention to spelling, grammar, structure

Failure to observe these requirements for class participation and homework/written assignments will gradually contribute to lowering the grade and risk not passing the course.

Oral presentation: 20%

In-class grammar test: 40% (10% preliminary period test, 10% mid-term and 20% final exam)

**WRITING PORTFOLIO:** During the second period of the course, compositions will be assigned in different formats: biography, autobiography, research, opinion, commentary, interview, essay.

**WRITTEN MID-TERM AND FINAL EXAMS:** An examination of reading comprehension, writing, vocabulary and grammar ability based on the linguistic and grammar topics covered in class.

**FINAL ORAL EXAM**: For the final test, students will have to present, with the help of a PowerPoint presentation, the result of personal research dedicated to one of the topics treated during the semester.
