COURSE	APPLIED ITALIAN COMMUNICATION AND CULTURE		
INSTRUCTOR	Guendalina Bamboli has taught at various language centers in Bologna and collaborated with Boston University in Padua. She has been teaching at BCSP since 2018. The focus of her research is the integration of foreign student in the Italian school system.		
COURSE CREDITS	3 (51.5 contact hours, combined in class and cultural excursion contact hours)		
COURSE OBJECTIVES	After successfully completing the course students will be able to: - interact with others in a simple way, ask and answer simple questions, read and write short paragraphs, speak with limited vocabulary about a number of topics - understand and use familiar everyday expressions and basic phrases - write simple messages or fill in forms with personal details - show knowledge of written and oral Italian at different proficiency levels, from beginner to low intermediate, including the interaction with locals in real life contexts.		
	- develop working knowledge of Italian culture with respect to the following areas: history; social habits; communication styles, values and attitudes; international relations; food traditions; and the arts in general, thereby gaining a deeper understanding of the Italian culture that they engage with it in everyday life (utilizing the <i>Cultural Iceberg</i> model) The course is comparable to a A1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR).		
COURSE DESCRIPTION	The course is designed for students who have no prior knowledge of Italian . It is a course taught in an immersive context which aims at presenting communicative functions and vocabulary, so that students are led to observe and reflect on the language by being exposed to real life situations and language. Students will be engaged and challenged by many practical activities in class or out of the class , both individually or in groups, to practice the language and to learn new linguistic and cultural elements. Students will utilize authentic audio clips (videos, songs, social media content) and written materials (flyers, cards, e-mails, text messages, posters, chats, job advertisements); role-playing and dramatization activities; didactic games; web resources and linguistic analyses as part of the class. The course also includes out of class activities such as interviews with Bologna's inhabitants, and excursions to the market or supermarket, local shops, bars and cafes, and cultural centers. Assignments include grammar exercises, written and oral tasks, and other projects that require students to explore the city of Bologna. Assignments are reviewed and corrected regularly in class. Activities described in the syllabus may vary according to the pace of student language acquisition.

	The cultural activities woven into the course will focus on lexicon, communication			
	and interaction in addition to gaining an understanding of the "why" behind the			
	cultural elements students observe, utilizing Bologna as the classroom. The			
	activities may include:			
	- Scavenger hunt on the history and traditions of the University of Bologna;			
	 - an on-site class at a "Cafe" in the city center – living like locals in Bologna; - an on-site class activity at "the market" to observe locals and interact with th 			
	learning new vocabulary;			
	- Guest speaker on Italians and their culinary traditions (American professor who has			
	been living in Italy for many years);			
	- Tour of the city center and discover the most famous secrets of Bologna and its			
	famous personalities (Marconi, Dalla, Galvani, Ugo e Laura Bassi, Giorgio Morandi,			
	Carducci)			
	- "Visitare Bologna: una proposta di itinerario", focused on the artistic aspects of			
	the city and its everyday life.			
TEACHING	The course is based on a communicative approach. The main focus is on the			
METHODOLOGY	development of the four basic skills simultaneously (the ability to listen, speak, read,			
WETTIODOLOGT	and write in order to understand and be understood).			
	This approach is flexible and stimulates the observation and the analysis on the			
	language by activating students' linguistic knowledge. Reflections on the language			
	are shared in class but guided and confirmed by the teacher so that the students			
	themselves can discover language mechanisms. This effort guarantees a stronger			
	and deeper acquisition of language structures and enables the students to use and			
	communicate in the target language more authentically and naturally.			
	Special attention is given to the vocabulary and the interference of L1 in the language			
	production: activities and exercises especially designed will be dedicated to avoid			
	typical and recurring mistake.
