DESCRIPTION: This course analyzes Italy's nation-building process from 1861-1960. As a newly formed country, Italy's first century is seen through a specific lens: the nation's rapport with what it considers "different," "other," and how this concept must be integrated, dominated or excluded. The history of Italy as a social, political and cultural entity post-unification cannot be separated from events such as the war against brigandage in the south, class conflicts involving farmers and factory workers at the margins of society, and colonial conquests through which Italy became part of the "European civilization." In 1960 Italy's colonialist period ended when Somalia became a UN trust territory.

The course is divided into three parts:

1861-1918, unresolved contradictions stemming from the *Risorgimento* and unification, the southern question, liberal colonialism, national identity after WWI.

1919-1943, post-war social conflicts, the development of Fascism, Mussolini's imperial regime up until its fall during WWII.

1943-1960, the new Republic and resistance to nazi-fascism, the political culture of Italy, including socialism and communism, the idea of Italy as a colonial nation and supporter of a "superior European civilization"

60 years following the last administration of an Italian colony, like many other Western nations, Italy must come to terms with its cumbersome past.

INSTRUCTOR: Michele Cento is Assistant Professor of Contemporary History at the University of Urbino "Carlo Bo". He has obtained the National Scientific Qualification to cover the position of Associate professor of Contemporary History.

His studies focus mainly on Italian and American history, with concentration on the Atlantic space and the relationships/cultural and political exchanges that have historically characterized it.

He is member of the editorial staff of the four-monthly review "Ricerche di Storia Politica", published by II Mulino, and in the scientific committee of the editorial series "l'Antidoto", edited by Viella. Among his publications: *L'ideologia atlantica. La deleggitimazione politica dalla Guerra fredda culturale al neoconservatorismo*, Mondadori Education, 2023; *Tra capitalismo e amministrazione. II liberalismo atlantico di Nitti*, il Mulino, 2017; (con R. Ferrari), *II socialismo ai margini. Classe e nazione nel Sud Italia e in Irlanda*, Rubbettino, 2018; *II governo delle differenze: Daniel Bell, la Great Society e il «populismo borghese»*, in «Scienza & Politica», 61 (2019), pp. 35-55. METHOD OF PRESENTATION: Classroom lectures and group discussions.

LANGUAGE OF INSTRUCTION: Italian
