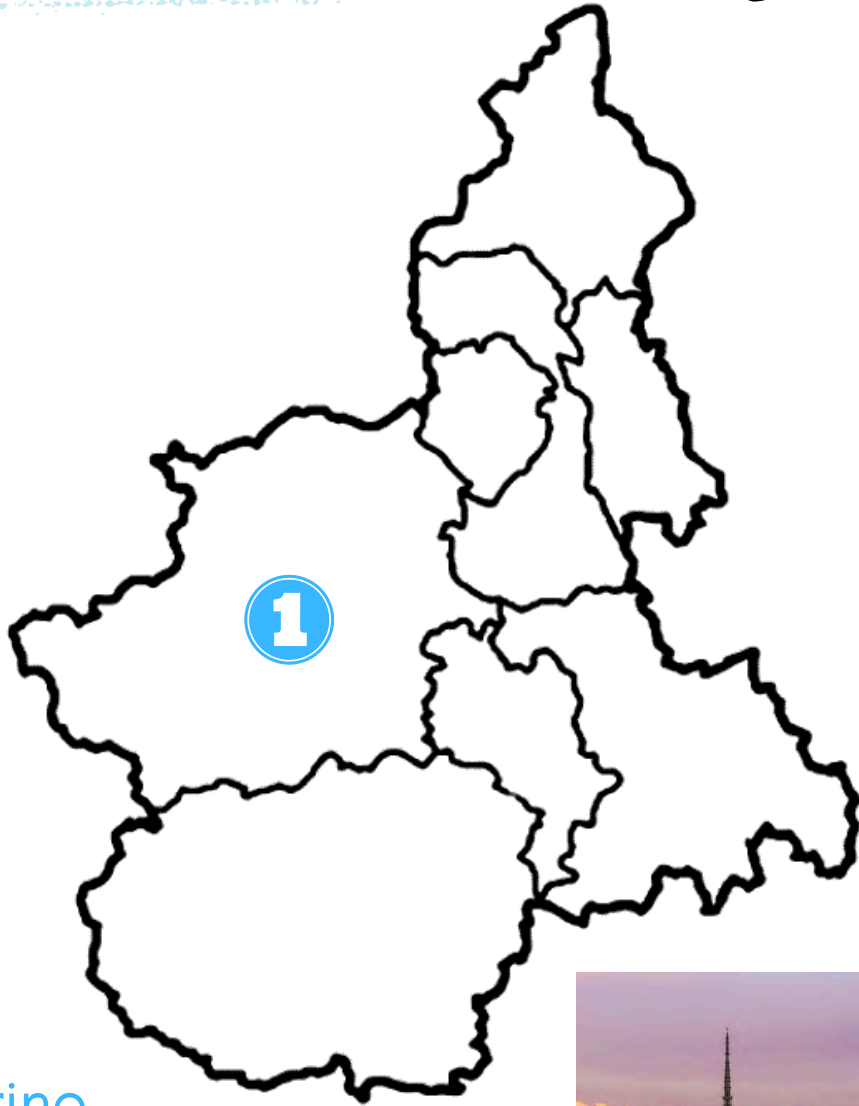

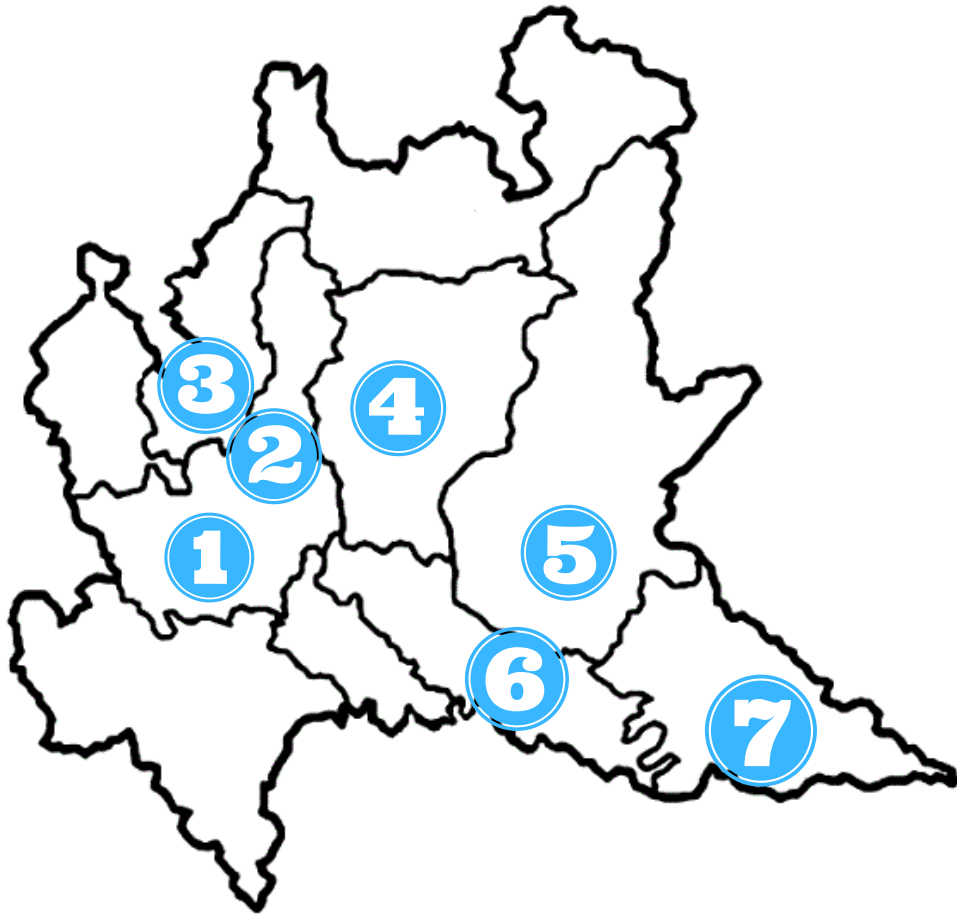


1. Torino

Lombardia



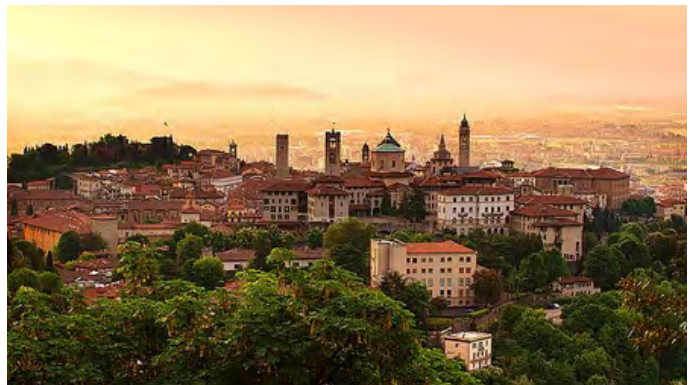
Milano: world capital of fashion and design, a metropolis in Northern Italy, also famous for its exclusive restaurants and shops.

Bergamo: famous for the funicular that connects the upper part to the lower part, it is also known as the city where the straciatella ice cream flavor was invented.





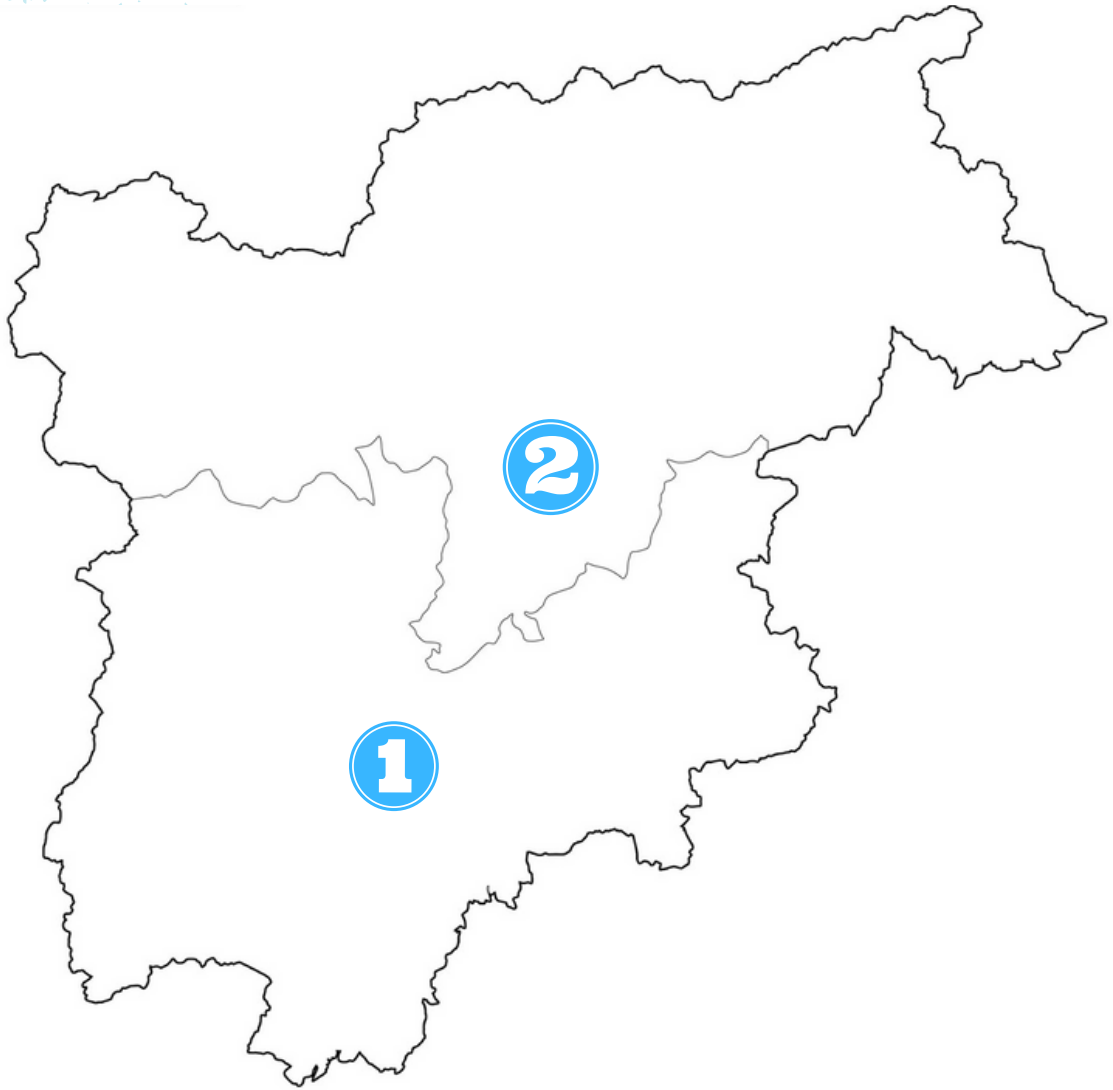
Brescia: famous for its Duomo Vecchio and Duomo Nuovo.

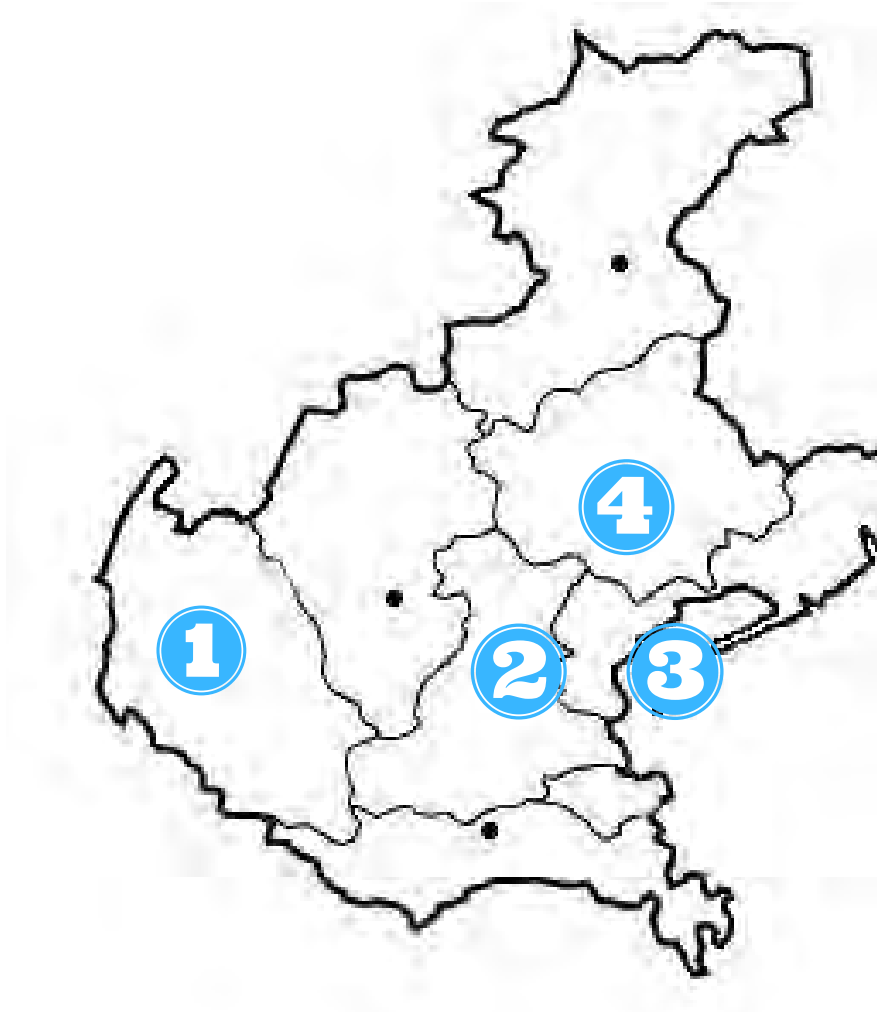

Treviso: home of Prosecco and Tiramisu.

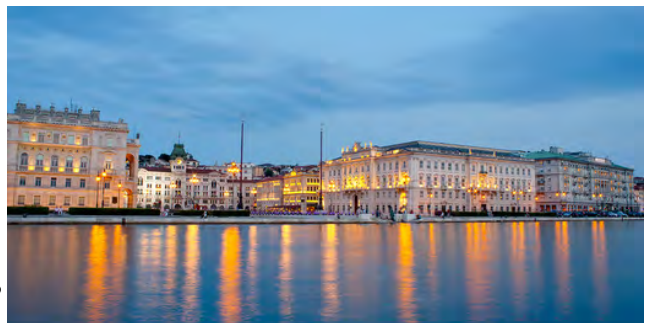

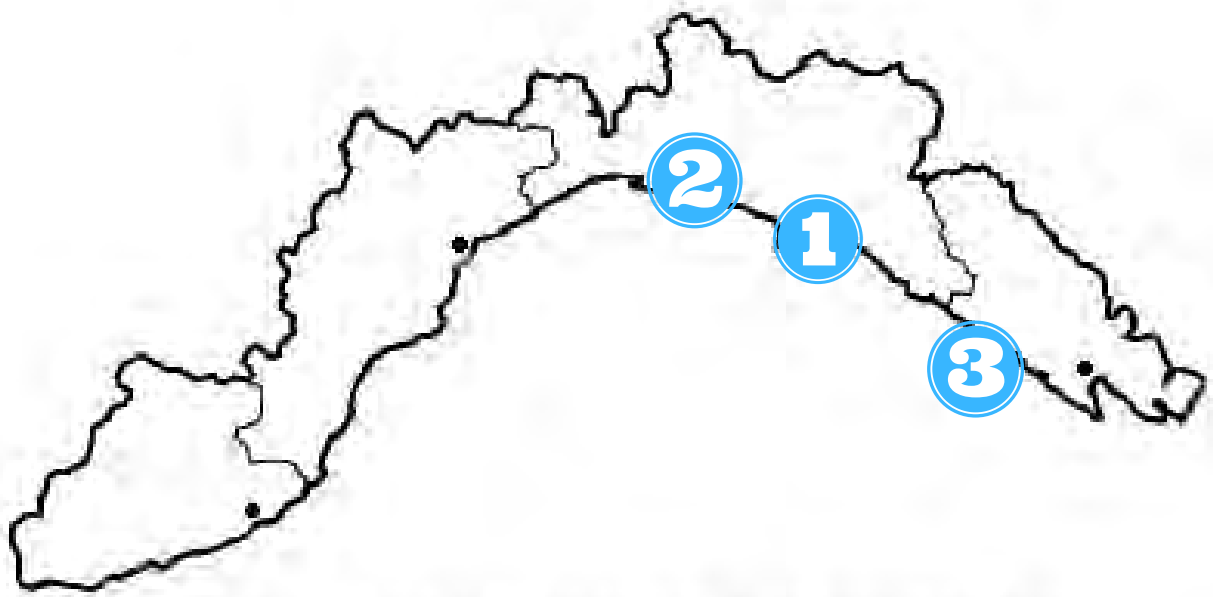

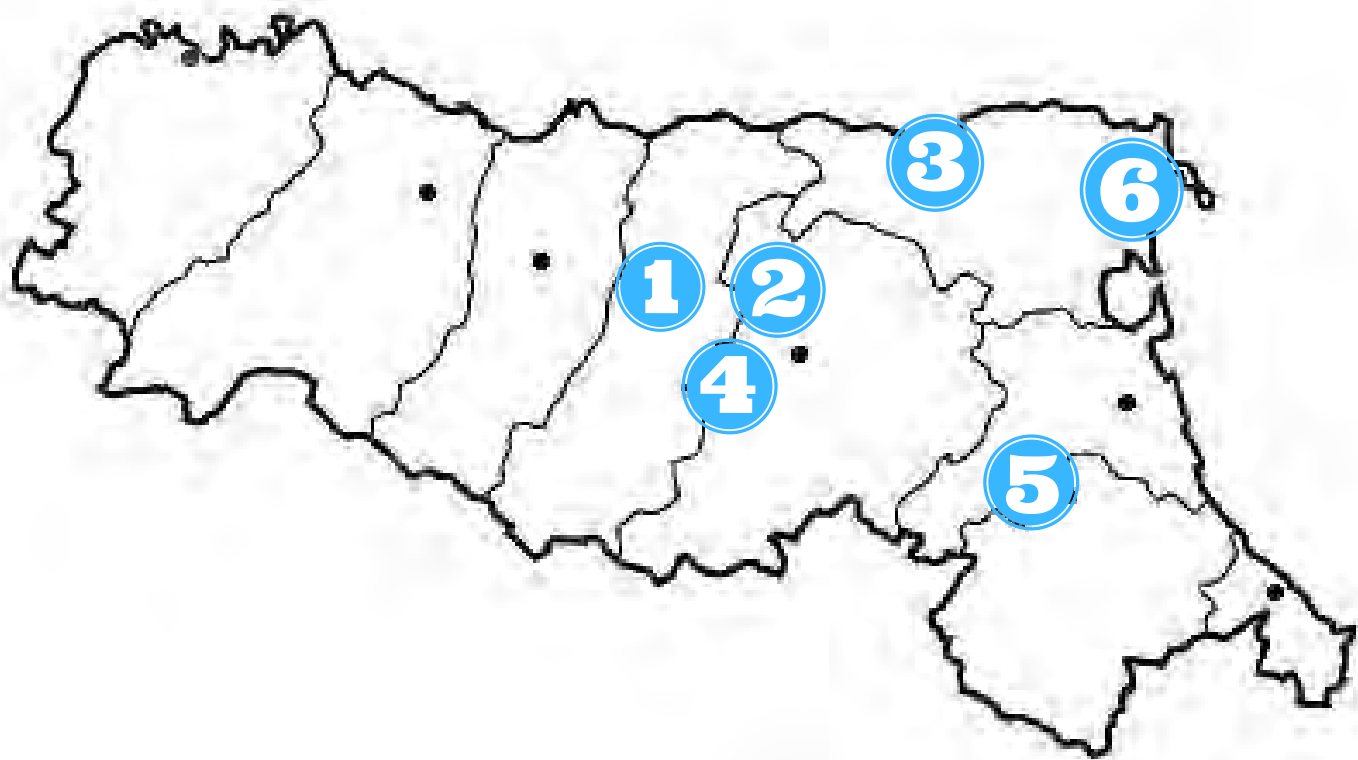
Camogli: small pearl nestled in the Golfo (Bay) Paradiso

Vignola: charming and historical. The ancient castle is a must-see!

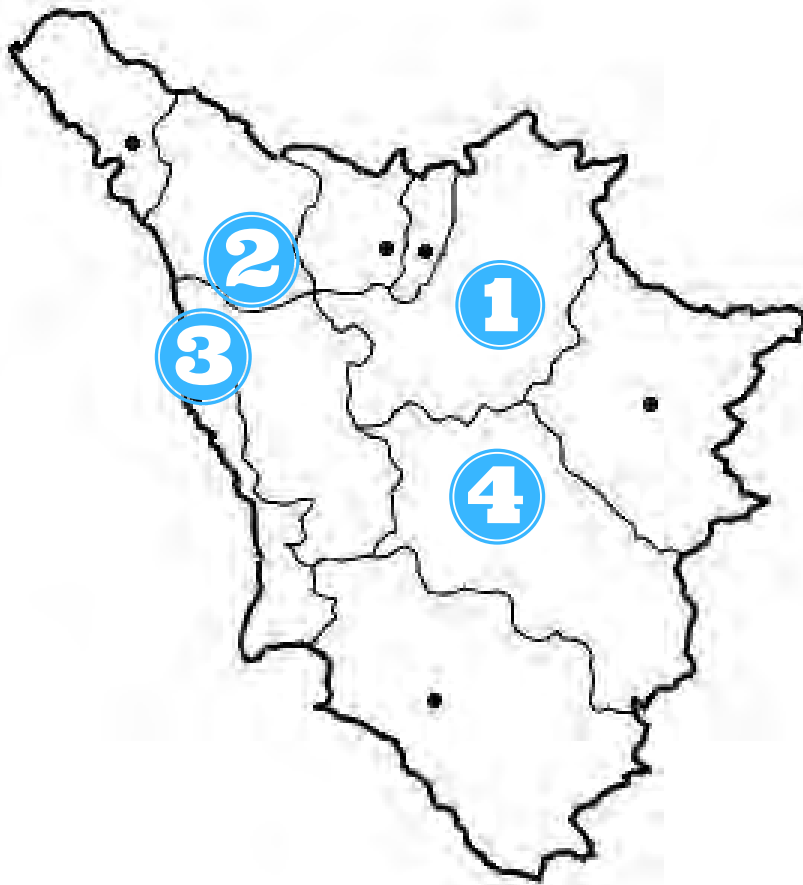

Lucca: one of the most important Italian cities of medieval times. Known for its circular “piazza”

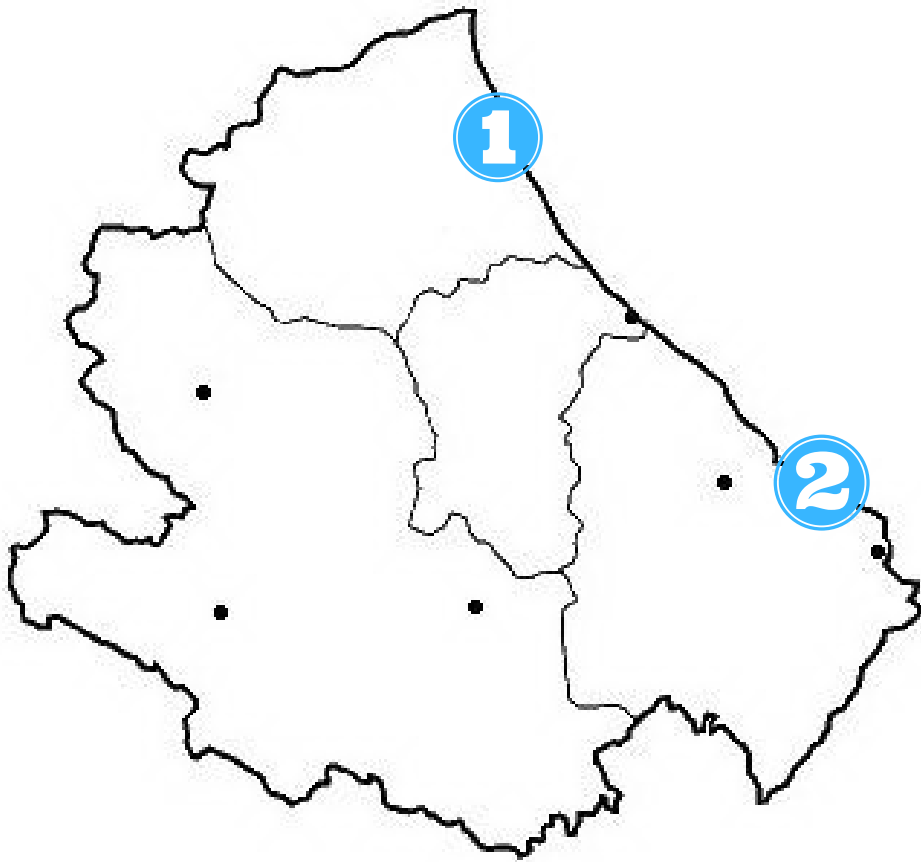


Pisa: famous all around the world for its tower! But Bologna actually has the tallest leaning tower in Italy!

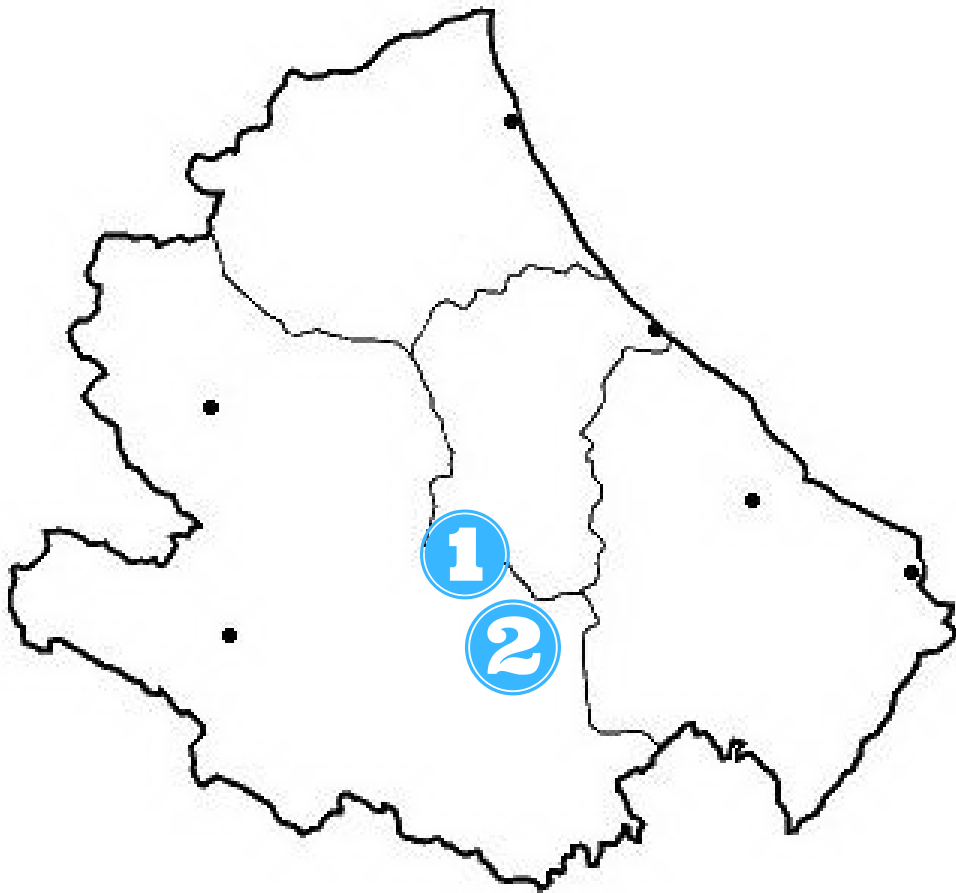

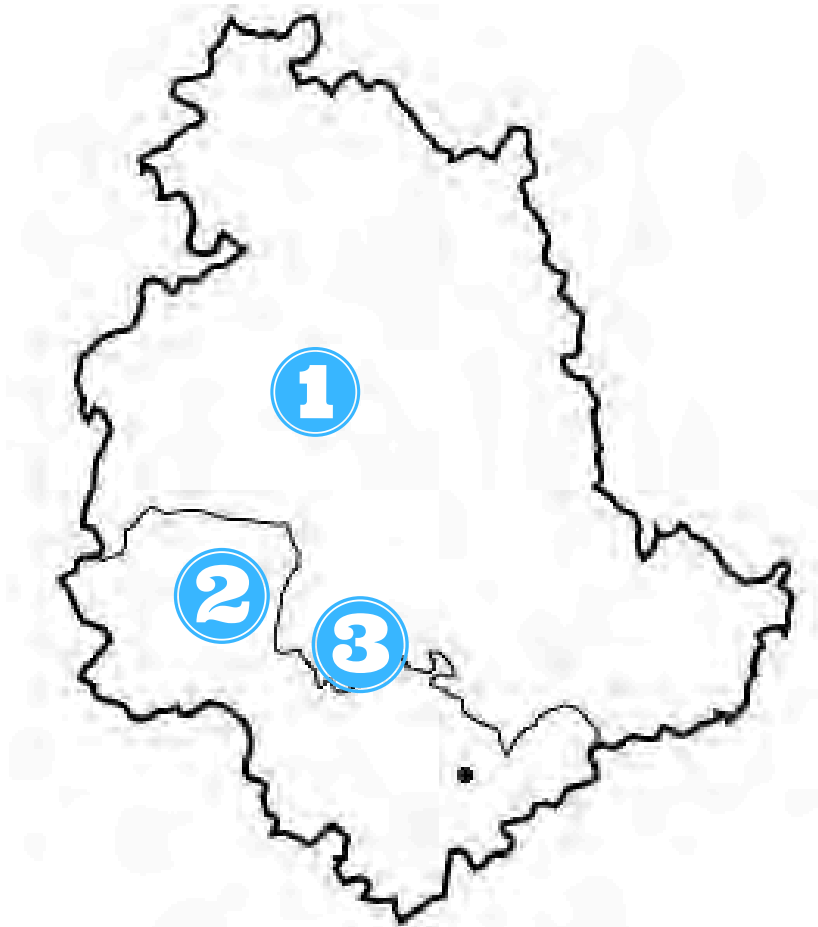
Reachable by buses of different companies such as *Arpa* and *Sangritana*, that connect the different villages of the Park with cities like Sulmona, Chieti, Pescara, Lanciano e Guardiagrele.

Parco della Majella: the park is has seven natural reserves and other protected areas. For this reason the it is the most important in the region.



Sulmona: famous for the production of “confetti”, a typical sweet gifted at weddings or baptisms made of sugared almonds. Here Ovidio was born and the city is still very interesting from an historical and architectural point of view.

Viterbo: Known as the “city of the Popes” and famous as a spa town and home to the University of Tuscia.



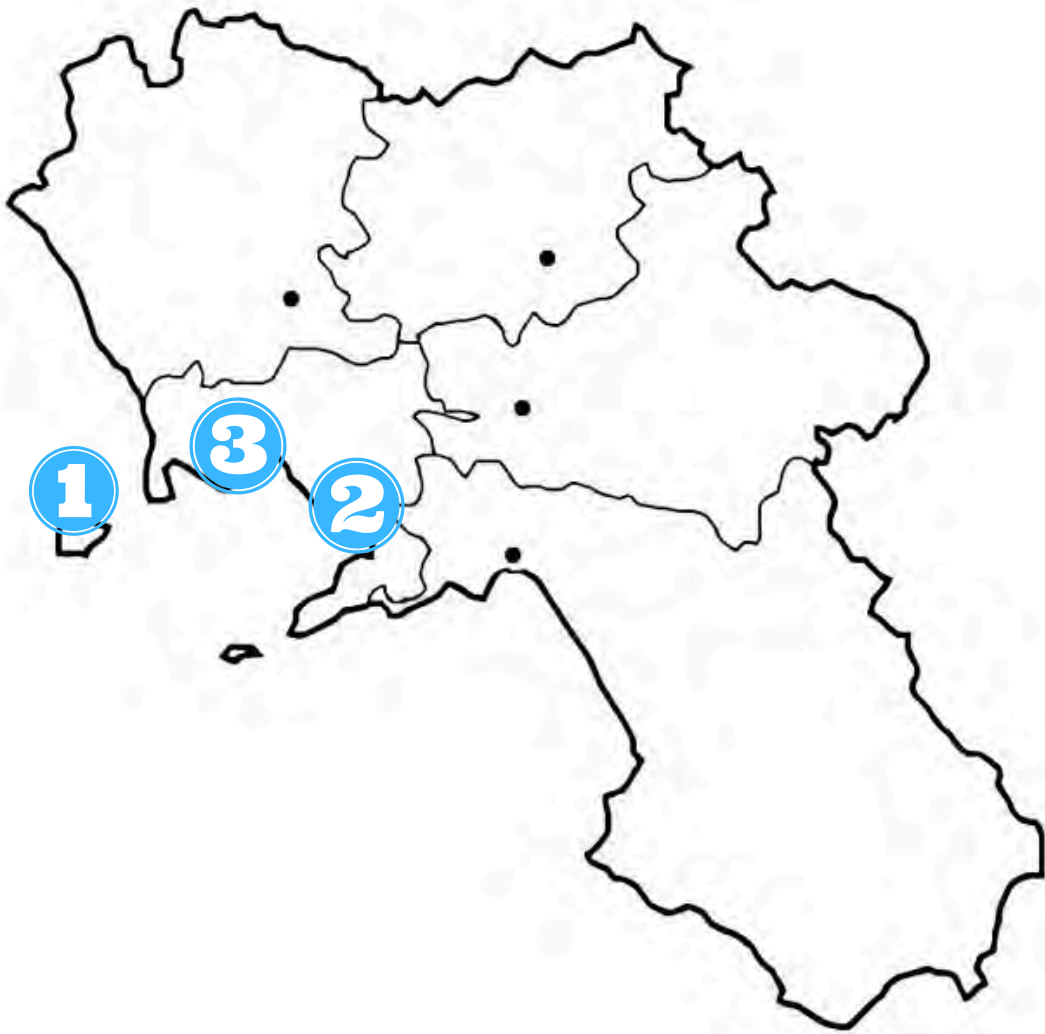
Roma: Italy's capital city, famous worldwide for its art and history.

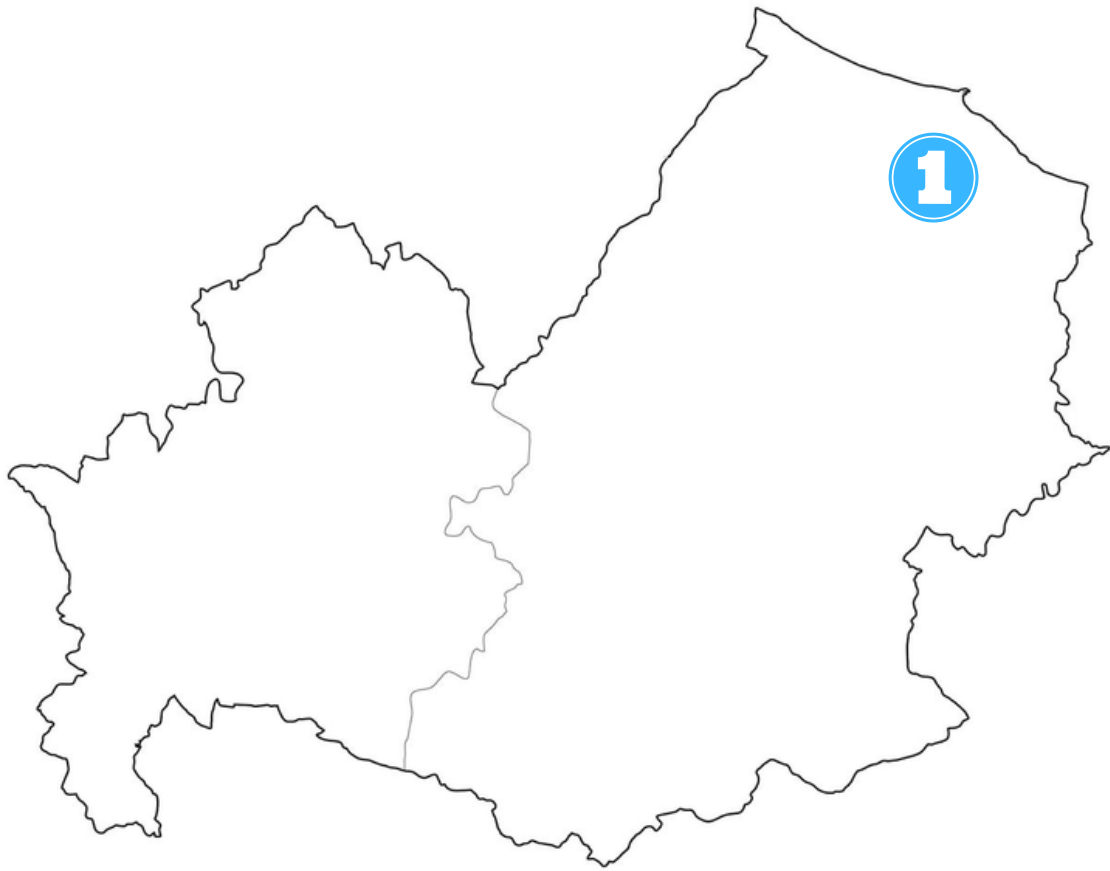
↖ *Ischia*: many geological, scenic, and natural wonders

Basilicata

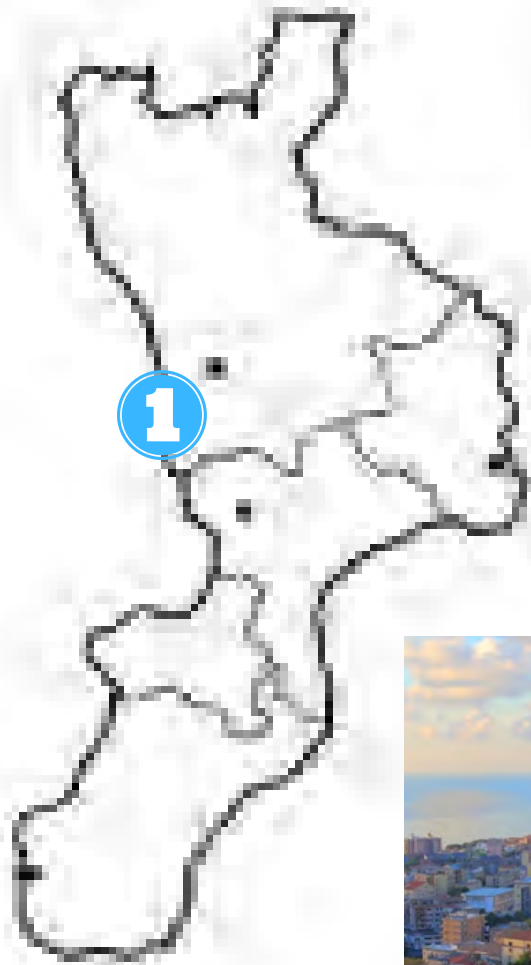

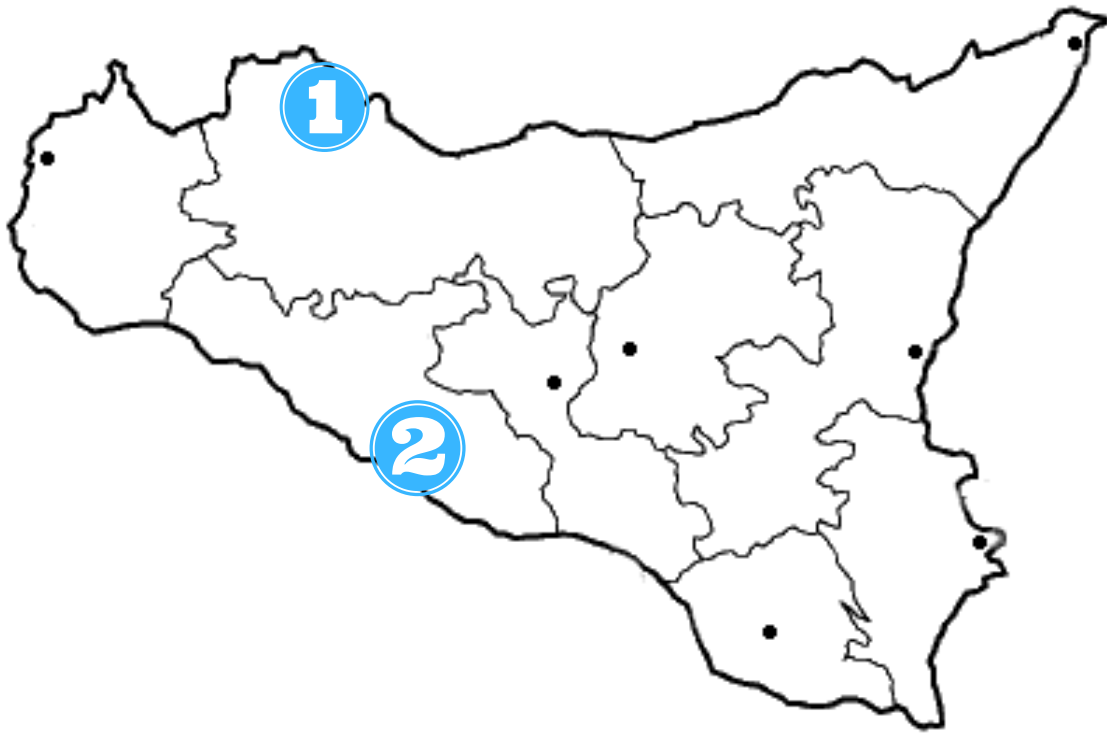
